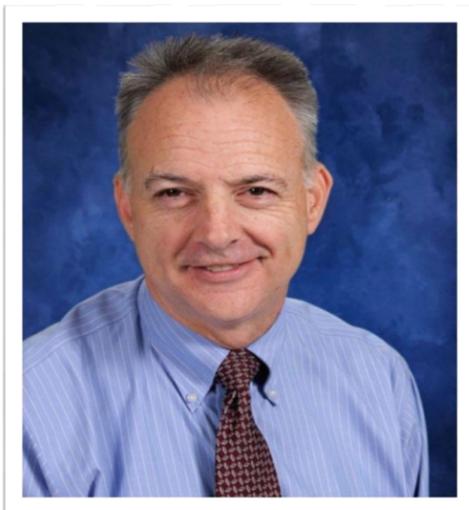

PBIS Tier I Overview and Refresher (PreK-12) (ST Code 1007444)

Audience: New members of PBIS teams, new district administrators, PBIS team members who have not been trained in Tier I, anyone needing a refresher in the Tier I framework.

PBIS is a framework or approach for assisting school personnel in adopting and organizing evidence-based behavioral interventions into an integrated continuum that enhances academic and social behavior outcomes for all students. PBIS IS NOT a packaged curriculum, scripted intervention, or manualized strategy. PBIS IS a prevention-oriented way for school personnel to: (a) organize evidence-based practices (b) improve their implementation of those practices (c) maximize academic and social behavior outcomes for students. PBIS supports the success of ALL students (PBIS.org).

Participants will:

- Identify the rationale for implementing PBIS
- Understand aspects of the PBIS framework
- Understand overarching expectations
- Understand a reinforcement system and systematic plan for error correction
- Understand a data management system to monitor behaviors
- Identify resources for PBIS at the state and national level

PBIS: Tier II

Some students will respond to the Tier I level of support but will still exhibit some specific difficulties. These students may be demonstrating academic and/or behavioral deficits that will require more intensive supports. Tier II interventions can be effective in working with students at-risk for academic and/or behavioral concerns. This training will expose participants to Tier II small group interventions. These are strategies and procedures put into place to support a group of students who display similar needs or deficits as identified through the data. The strategies that will be discussed include Check In Check Out (CICO), Social and Academic instructional Groups, and Check and Connect. There will be a particular focus on CICO, with time provided for teams to begin planning this intervention.

Preparing for School and Life Success; Supporting Executive Functioning During the Preschool and Elementary Years (ST Code 10067543)

Join us for a new professional development session focused on a topic that will help children excel academically while also preparing them for life success. This session will focus on what are executive functioning skills and why this skill set is critical in preschool and elementary settings. Generation Rx: Interactive Prevention Strategies for Educators

Audience: Any Educator Responsible for Addressing Opiate Law/HB367 (Including Guidance Counselors, HPE Teachers, Athletic Directors and Coaches, etc.) Summit ESC, Summit County Community Partnership (SCCP), Pastoral Counseling Services, and Summit County Public Health are collaborating together this school year on an opiate prevention campaign/grant focusing on educating students about safe medicine usage, storage and disposal.
